- Assembled four new complete crates for grade 4 (fishing) increasing the total number of crates from 4 to 8
- Added new content to all grade 1 (birding) crates
- Added new content to all grade 2 (wildlife) crates
- Assembled 4 new complete crates for JK/SK (exploring)
